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# Nanchang University ART12: Western Art: Renaissance to Present

#### **Contact Hours**

This course is composed of 24 lecture sessions, 3 tutorial sessions and 9 office contact hours. Each lecture session takes 2 contact hours in length; each tutorial session takes 3 contact hours in length; There will be a Q-A review session(3 contact hours) and Final Exam (3 contact hours) at the end of this term. This course has 72 contact hours in total.

#### **Course Description**

This course surveys painting, sculpture, and architecture in Europe and America from the 15th century to the 1960s.

The emphasis is two fold:

- 1. Recognizing the visual characteristics of different periods and individual styles through study of major monuments.
- 2. Utilizing works of art to better understand the social, cultural, and economic realities of various historical eras.


