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Nanchang University ECON452: Economic Research Methods

Credit: 6

Contact Hours

This course is composed of 24 lecture sessions, 3 tutorial sessions and 9 office contact hours. Each lecture session takes 2 contact hours in length; each tutorial session takes 3 contact hours in length; There will be a Q-A review session(3 contact hours) and Final Exam (3 contact hours) at the end of this term. This course has 72 contact hours in total.

Course Description

This course covers the steps and process of conducting applied economic research. The Computable General Equilibrium Model will be introduced in this course. Students will learn to combine economic theory with real economic data to analyze the impacts of policies or shocks in the economy. And the final paper-writing will include the selection of topic, literature review and survey, selection of research method and approach, formulation of hypothesis, data analysis and testing, and summarizing results.

After this course, students will:

- 1. Be familiar with the techniques and software involved in designing general equilibrium models.
- 2. Explain the process of doing research in economics.
- 3. Learn the vast array of information available to economists over the Internet and in the library.
- 4. Use statistical methods to analyze and evaluate the application of economic theory and reasoning
- 5. Learn to write an effective research paper and be able to effectively present it to your fellow students and faculty in economics.
